Goal of the Module

- Understand how moral philosophy and ethical reasoning are related to the military profession
- Discuss the concept of a culture of war and the connection between ethics, law, politics, and religion
- Identify and explain the relationship between different theoretical approaches employed in the ethics of war and the use of force
- Explore the viability of the 'just war' framework for justifying actual wars and for regulating the conduct of hostilities
- Discuss ethical dilemmas present in different forms of war (inter-state war, insurgency/counter-insurgency, terrorism/counter-terrorism, pre-emptive/preventive)
